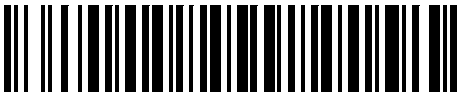

**Pioneering Flight**

In 1947, flying from Australia to England took four days and required nine stops. Seventy years later, the 2017 route had become much simpler and more direct. However, it still required at least one refuelling stop, meaning the journey took around 20 hours. In March the following year, however, airline passengers experienced history. Qantas flight QF9 took off from Perth, Western Australia in the evening and landed in London 17 hours later, without stopping.

The flight is the first direct passenger service between the two continents, covering a distance of 9,009-miles. This is 24% further than Qantas Airline’s previous longest route of 7,275 miles, between London and Jakarta. Currently, the world’s longest direct flight is 9,025 miles from Qatar to New Zealand, operated by Qatar Airways. Qantas is already planning non-stop flights from Eastern Australia to Europe, which it intends to add to its global schedules within five years.

Aviation consultant John Strickland said, ‘This Perth-London route is a test of how successful long-haul flying can be. We’ll see if the investment is worthwhile.’ Rico Merkert, from Sydney’s business school, is already a believer, ‘These travellers want to fly fast and comfortably, and they’re prepared to pay the premium.’ Lisa Norman, the captain, said, ‘It’s an amazing development and very exciting.’ The Boeing 787-9 Dreamliners on the Perth-London route have several advantages over other models, including lower noise levels, improved air quality and larger windows. They offer 42 business class flat-bed seats, 28 premium economy seats and 166 economy seats, slightly fewer than non-direct flights.

However, comparing flight times and prices shows the difficulties Qantas faces. Return economy flights start at £1,095. Going via Singapore or Abu Dhabi takes three hours longer but costs start from only £580. The added advantage of stopping on route is the chance to escape the cramped economy seating. Qantas hope that at least their inflight meals, voted as among the best in the world, will please any passengers unhappy with other aspects of the flight. For many on the direct flight, however, taking off at dusk and landing before dawn, means experiencing the world’s longest flight without daylight, which might not be very appealing. The success of this route will lie in customer satisfaction.

A. Perfume fans have always known that perfumes make you smell nice but the latest perfumes claim to make you feel better or even work better. New brand *St Giles* uses rosemary, which it claims makes wearers feel more alert, by increasing the speed and accuracy of their mental performance.

B. In future, a new smell test should be able to help museums look after their art works. Special chemical sensors can detect smells given off by objects which are starting to decay, before the decay is even visible. This technique can be used on everything from plastic sculptures to decomposing paper. The test works in the same way as doctors who diagnose some illnesses by analysing the chemical compounds in human breath.

C. For about a year, commuters have been commenting on the fact that the District line platform at Victoria tube station smells rather odd. Some think it smells disgusting; others like a delicious steak. Investigation has revealed that the source of the smell is a new burger restaurant, *Bleekers*, which opened its doors at the same time as the smell appeared, and which backs on to the end of the platform.
