Section R1 (13 marks)

Read the following passage and answer all the questions.

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Goat Man

Tom Thwaites is a designer who describes himself as interested in technology and science. In 2014, he was unemployed. One day, while walking his friend's poodle, he thought, 'A dog's life must be better than mine.' This marked the beginning of a new project - to understand what makes us different to animals. He briefly considered being an elephant, but learned that, of all mammals, they are most similar to humans in emotional behaviour. His other choice, a gorilla, would clearly have been a huge risk to his physical safety. He was advised that living as a goat would help him achieve his goals better. He located a goat-herder online who was happy to work with him and applied for a financial grant to study animal psychology. This was enough to fund his experiment.

Thwaites was keen to be accepted by the goats, so he had some legs especially designed to help him to walk convincingly. He also had a helmet and a chest protector in case any animals became aggressive. He even designed a goat's stomach out of plastic so he could eat raw grass, but had to abandon this idea after being warned of the health issues of such a limited diet.

In the Swiss Alps, Thwaites spent three days mixing with goats. He had no human company other than the goat-herder, who occasionally checked his animals, and a photographer, who observed from a distance. Thwaites found that his false legs were the greatest problem. Although he continued to use them, going downhill was particularly painful and he kept falling over. At first, the goats did not seem happy with the newcomer, and he thought they might attack him. The goat-herder explained that Thwaites had taken the highest point on the hillside, which was an error. In goat hierarchy, he should have been lower down. He followed this advice and the animals immediately tolerated him.

Thwaites has written a book, in which he describes his observations, including how surprisingly physical a goat's life is, and how tolerant they are. He now wants to keep a herd of goats himself, but needs to move out of London first.
